

**BOROUGH OF BROWNSVILLE
FAYETTE COUNTY PENNSYLVANIA
OCTOBER 12, 2022**

The Regular meeting of the Council of the Borough of Brownsville was held this evening at the Borough building in Brownsville. The meeting was called to order by President, Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich at 6:00 p.m. by reciting the Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance.

The following members were present: Council President, Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich, Council Vice President Paul Synuria, Beth Bock, Jackie Jackson, and Kasandra Ward. Also present were Solicitor Mitch Mitchell, Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr., and Borough Secretary/Treasurer Melissa S. O'Brien. Councilman Mike Walters was not present.

RECOGNITION OF VISITORS

Lisa Synuria, 219 Cadwallader Street. Mrs. Synuria spoke on the Brownsville Police Benevolent Association's (BPBA) Annual Police Officers' Ball, which was held on Saturday, October 1, 2022. There were approximately 60 people in attendance. Several compliments were received by those in attendance and the event was a huge success. Mrs. Synuria wanted to thank those who supported the BPBA and remind everyone that 100% of the proceeds go towards the police officers and the K9 fund.

Destiny Bock, 315 Middle Alley. Destiny is with the Water Street Park Group and noted that her group raised a total of \$5,088.81, and at this time, they would like to donate \$3,000 to the Fenwick Park account. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted that this is match money to be used towards the playground, and that with the cost of playground equipment, we will more than likely need every dime of match money that they help with.

Joe Barantovich, 427 Pearl Street. Mr. Barantovich would like Council to know that the LHVB Grant has been requested this year. With the help of Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr., we have three "Welcome to Brownsville" signs, including one large and two smaller ones. No sites have been chosen yet. Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. noted that we have signage in the Borough Building that has been here for possibly five years or more, and they look similar to the sign on the Northside at the Castle site. The grant request was also for sealing and paving the parking lot at the amphitheater, topsoil and seeding at Hope Park, banner updates for the movie screen, historic signage, and possibly some additional signage throughout town. The grant request is in excess of \$45k, and there is no request for the Borough to contribute. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich clarified that the existing signs will be enhanced, so they will still be used. Kasandra Ward asked if there was any intent to install an irrigation system at the stage, and Mr. Barantovich responded that there was talk about the War Memorial Post and/or the fire stations possibly working on that.

Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted that establishing signage and matching colors on this signage to other colors throughout town would help to establish consistency within the Borough and help the town stand out so that people notice Brownsville.

Street signs were discussed, possibly adding a scroll topper. Kasandra Ward would recommend doing so in the Business District, and Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich would like to see it everywhere in the Borough.

Joe Barantovich noted that there is a 25% match for this grant, which will be made by the Perennial Project either in-kind or cash, making the total cost/value of this project well over \$50k. Paul Synuria asked about the movie screen and noted that there is peeling paint on it. Joe Barantovich noted that it was damaged during transit and painted on site, and that can be done again. Beth Bock asked if we needed PennDOT approval to place signage on Route 40, which Mr. Barantovich noted that he believed we would need prior approval. Mr. Barantovich noted that he has discussed this with Homer Yeardie, Brownsville Township Supervisor, and the property line between the Borough and Township is one of the possible locations. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted if anyone has any feedback or comment on this to please reach out to Mr. Barantovich.

Kasandra Ward asked if we use US Municipal for this type of signage, and Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. stated we do not, but he will try and find out where we had them made in the past.

OPENING OF SEALED BIDS

Paul Synuria will open bids for the demolition of 125 High Street, 502 High Street, and 509 High Street. This demolition project also included 1322 Water Street, which has already been

demolished. The Borough budgeted for \$5,000 in the general fund for the demolition of blighted properties, and the RACF has kindly offered to put the remaining funding into this project.

Bid received on October 12, Dave Woodhouse. **Total Bid \$21,000**

Demolish, back fill, grade, seed, and mulch.

(125 High Street – \$6,800; 502 High Street; \$10,000 - 509 Baltimore Street - \$4,200)

Bid received on September 10, PCI Energy. **Total Bid \$35,900**

Mobilization of equipment and materials, demolition of single-family residential structure, removal of debris, backfill scoped building foundation, seed and mulch of scoped area, demobilization of equipment.

(125 High Street - \$16,500; 502 High Street - \$15,500; 509 Baltimore Street - \$3,900)

Bid received October 6, EJ Burns Construction. **Total Bid \$ 41,450**

Mobilization and demobilization equipment, demolition of single-family house, backfill, seed, mulch scoped area foundation. Due upon receipt; 2% interest after 30 days.

(125 High Street - \$18,500; 502 High Street - \$17,550; 509 Baltimore Street - \$5,400)

Bid received October 4, Martin Excavation. **Total Bid \$25,500**

Demolition of building/home. Backfill, seed, and mulch.

(125 High Street - \$6,500; 502 High Street - \$16,500; 509 Baltimore Street - \$2,500)

Bid received October 6, Murin & Murin. **Total Bid \$41,500**

Demolition of existing residence, backfill, seed & mulch, demobilization. Finance charge of 1.5% per month on past due invoices.

(125 High Street - \$18,000; 502 High Street - \$17,050; 509 Baltimore Street - \$6,450)

Motion by Paul Synuria to offer the contract to Dave Woodhouse, pending all calculations are correct. Second by Jackie Jackson. Kasandra Ward would like to note that one of the bids specifies "removal" of debris. She would like to make sure that the bid was also to remove debris. Paul Synuria amends his motion to be sure that removal of the debris is included. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted that even though we are not spending Borough money, she asks for Roll Call. **Roll Call:** Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich, yes; Paul Synuria, yes; Beth Bock, yes; Jackie Jackson, yes; Kasandra Ward, yes. Votes are unanimous. Motion carries.

McMillen Engineering was at the Borough building on Monday, October 10, 2022 to open bids for the demolition of 149 High Street. A total of four (4) bids were received, including bids from Advanced Builders for \$240,605; Piccolomini Contractors for \$160,150; Dore & Associates for \$342,225; and Hunter Excavating for \$144,639.50.

Motion by Beth Bock to approve the bid from Hunter Excavating. Second by Jackie Jackson. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted that this money came in from a RACF grant on the Northside, which was then transferred to this project. Paul Synuria would like to remind everyone of the issues that we had with the Market Street demolitions with Hunter Excavating. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted we could pass that on to the engineer and/or site manager from McMillen. **Roll Call:** Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich, yes; Paul Synuria, no; Beth Bock, yes; Jackie Jackson, yes; Barbara Pepper, yes; Kasandra Ward, yes. 5-1. Motion carries. Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. asked if there was a projected demo date, which Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted there was not.

MINUTES

Minutes were not available for September.

MAYOR'S REPORT – Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr.

Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. is recommending that we bring back Stanley Jablonsky as a part-time police officer at a rate of \$18 per hour, with no benefits, effective today, October 12, 2022. Motion by Paul Synuria. Second by Jackie Jackson. Paul Synuria would like to be sure that Officer Jablonsky is willing to come back as an officer, after retiring as chief. Chief Brant spoke on the matter and stated that he spoke to Officer Jablonsky and he would like to stay on the roster and help with events, but not necessarily working the streets.

Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. swords noted that the part-time budget has over \$4,000 left in it for this calendar year. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich reminded Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. and Chief Brant to stay within their budget with part-time workers. Kasandra Ward asked if we could project the budget for this expense, which Chief Brant noted he would sit down and develop a budget, which would include Light Up Night and the Halloween Parade.

Beth Bock asked if Jablonsky would be doing any patrols, which Chief Brant and the Mayor noted it would just be for community functions, parades, movies, and things of that nature. Kasandra Ward would like to see a schedule with hours and numbers, more of a proposal with a budget. Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. noted that it is difficult to schedule part-time workers. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich stated that Chief Brant will be on the streets patrolling, and rather than him coming off the streets, the department will use Jablonsky part-time so that he can handle any necessary administrative duties so that the Chief can continue his on-street patrols. **Roll Call:** Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich, yes; Paul Synuria, yes; Beth Bock, yes; Jackie Jackson, yes; Barbara Pepper, yes; Kasandra Ward, no. 5-1. Motion carries.

The police fines for the month totaled \$71.54 from the County and \$1,036.58 from the MDJ.

There were 78 calls for service, 12 citations, 9 incidents, and 1 arrest. 0 prisoner transports were reported. A total of 872 miles were put on the police vehicles last month.

FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION – Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich

Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich spoke on Finance and noted that Mike Walters is seeking estimates on the furnace repair to heat the police side of the building, the basement, and the 2nd floor. The administration side of the building is working extra hard to compensate for the lack of heat in the rest of the building. The repair estimates are around \$15k, and there is talk on forced air heat and alternate heating sources, rather than fixing an outdated boiler. There are no recommendations for tonight's meeting, but we do have to make a decision on what to do in the building when it gets colder. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich believes that Michael Walters has an idea for a temporary solution, but this is something that will remain on the agenda.

Budget numbers were due to Melissa S. O'Brien last Friday, and are now late.

Budget reports were included in Council's folders, but were not discussed. The total funds at this time are \$536,151.83, including General Fund \$201,649.03, Payroll \$2,599.23, Petty Cash \$2958.23, Act 13 \$28,146.41, K-9 Fund \$5,454.30, Fire Escrow \$6,667.00, Parking Authority \$1,920.59, PLGIT \$61,943.53, ARPA Grant Fund \$225,476.27, and Comprehensive Plan Fund \$2,000.24.

Monthly bills paid were \$101,097.91. Bills that still need paid total \$7,877.32 from the General Fund, \$4,170.25 from the Payroll Fund, \$0 from the ARPA Grant Fund, \$0 from PLGIT, \$57,629.50 from various other grants. Deposits this month totaled \$127,977.37.

Motion by Paul Synuria to pay the water and electric bills, and the current taxes. Second by Beth Bock. **Roll Call:** Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich, yes; Paul Synuria, yes; Beth Bock, yes; Jackie Jackson, yes; Kasandra Ward, yes. Votes are unanimous. Motion carries.

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS – Mike Walters

Nothing to report.

CODE ENFORCEMENT – Paul Synuria

Code fines for the month totaled \$610.76.

Paul Synuria stated that we have been trying for at least two years to get our current animal control person to sign a contract, which has not been done. At this time, Paul Synuria makes a motion to sign a contract with Hoffman's Kennels. They are not a No Kill shelter, but at this time we do not have anyone else willing to do it. We were assured by Hoffman's that they are not as bad as people say they are. Mayor Ross H. Swords, Jr. noted that he believes the issue we had in the past with Hoffman's was based on a "per animal" fee that we were being charged. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich asked if they are charging \$100 per call, and if there is a limit. Paul Synuria clarified that the owners are charged the \$100, not the Municipality, provided an owner is found. If they are called out after hours or on emergency calls, there is a \$100 per animal charge to the Borough (unless an owner is known, at which time, the fee is charged to the owner). Melissa S. O'Brien noted that in the last month, there were 5 dogs rescued by the Borough, which would have made that a \$500 monthly charge for the Borough that month. Second by Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich. This is a 2-year contract. Solicitor, Mitch Mitchell noted that we can send a counter-proposal back to Hoffman's. For clarification, there is a \$150 monthly fee, plus \$50 for boarding, plus \$100 if no owner is located. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted that there is no other option at this time. Paul Synuria amends his Motion to ask for a one-year contract, with a one-month early start date, with said contract running from November 2022 through December 2023. **Roll Call:** Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich, yes; Paul Synuria, yes; Beth Bock, yes; Jackie Jackson, yes; Barbara Pepper, yes; Kasandra Ward, yes. Votes are unanimous. Motion carries.

Our code officer reported 6 complaints, 2 inspected houses, 1 court hearing attended, 2 citations issued, and 3 letters sent.

Motion by Paul Synuria to officially establishing a Department of Code Enforcement, and establish an ORI number for our Code Officer, Mark Gordon, so that we are able to obtain information to enforce local ordinances within the Borough. Second by Barbara Pepper. All in favor. Motion carries.

FIRE – Paul Synuria

Fire reports are included in everyone's folders for this month, but were not discussed. For the month of September, Northside fire had 1 fire, 11 rescue and emergency calls, 2 hazardous conditions, 3 good intent calls, and 8 false alarms.

For the month of September, Southside had 5 fires, 11 rescue and emergency calls, 1 hazardous condition, 2 service calls, 1 good intent call, and 10 false alarms.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – Barbara Pepper

Barbara Pepper will be revising the LERTA ordinance, and asks Melissa S. O'Brien to email her the latest copy of the ordinance that we have on file.

LIBRARY – Paul Synuria

Paul Synuria noted that Horror at the Library Short Horror Story Contest has officially begun. Friday is the last day to submit. So far this year, the library has received over 55 stories. These kids have really worked hard, and they should all be proud. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich stated it is a great project. Prizes will be awarded soon for the 300-3,000 word stories. Winners will be announced on October 21, 2022.

Paul Synuria noted the Library is hosting a side-hustle on Saturday, November 19, 2022 from 14 for vendors and small businesses showcasing their products. Admission will be free. There will be auction baskets and more. All proceeds will be donated to the Library.

PUBLIC RELATIONS – Beth Bock

Beth Bock is talking to "higher ups" at First National Bank to establish an online payment system for code enforcement fines. There is no contract to be approved at this time.

PUBLIC WORKS – Kasandra Ward

Kasandra Ward did meet with Melissa S. O'Brien for budget discussions. Kasandra Ward asked Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich to speak on the DCED grant that was put out. Starting from Water Street to the northern part of the Southside, Kasandra Ward noted 22 streets that need repairs. McMillen is putting together a \$500k request for this work. We are asking Casey's office for the other half of this funding, to make this a \$1M project. At the end of this project, we would have streets, sidewalks, and lighting completely updated. There is a short time to get this request in. Barbara Pepper asked if Hollow Road was on this list, but Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted that the Hollow Road grant has already been requested. If we do not get the grant in November, we can go back to the new DCED grant and ask for a change of scope to add it to the new grant. Representative Snyder is at the end of her term, Pat Stefano is aware of Hollow Road, and we have reached out to Ryan Warner so that everyone is aware and Hollow Road is at the top of the list. Beth Bock asked if we would have this money before the asphalt plants close, which Kasandra Ward noted we would not as they are closing now. Beth Bock asked if there was any way to put wattles or something down on the outside of the Jersey Barriers to slow water down. Kasandra Ward noted we can close the road down if need be. Barbara Pepper is concerned with all the other road closures; if Hollow Road is shut down, the only other way to get on the hill would be Angle Road or to turn around and go back up High Street. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich feels that a decision needs to be made soon, before we end up having to make an emergency decision, at which point we will not be able to open to reroute traffic for future projects. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich also noted the Cast Iron Bridge will not be done until 2024. The Charles Street Bridge will not go into construction until next year. Kasandra Ward noted that we cannot do anything at all until April. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich suggested asking PennDOT for recommendations to slow traffic down, possibly lights or something to change the direction of the water flow.

RECREATION – Jackie Jackson

The kickoff for Fenwick Park is tomorrow, October 14 at 6:00 p.m. Jackie Jackson sat down with some of the high school kids and they picked out the equipment they would like to see at the park, which totaled \$134,594. Barbara Pepper asked what we do about the kickoff if it rains, which

Jackie Jackson noted there is no backup plan. Beth Bock asked if anyone else knew about this, which Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted this is a kickoff, not a ribbon cutting. Jackie Jackson would like to thank Cameron Walters for the sign.

TAX BUREAU – Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich

Nothing to report.

SOLICITOR’S REPORT – Mitch Mitchell

Nothing to report.

OLD BUSINESS

The Charles Street Bridge construction will hopefully start in the spring, though we did not receive any bids.

Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich asked our consultants to get a final draft of the Comprehensive Plan to us by tonight’s meeting, but the consultant was unable to finalize it by tonight.

DCNR has an application out right now for trails, and they only have a small amount of money available. They recommended we wait until early next year.

The Luzerne Park seat board has been filled. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich asked if Wilson Racing provided us with insurance, which Melissa S. O'Brien noted we did, which indemnifies the Borough of Brownsville and Luzerne Township.

McMillen invoices are listed on the yellow Bills Due sheet, but no further action will be taken at this time.

The Repository purchases that the Borough bid on were all granted, and we are signing the Deeds tonight. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich is looking for ideas from Council for the old brewery as far as what we want to do with it.

There is no update on the Union Station Building.

There is a meeting at 1 p.m. tomorrow between the DEP, McMillen, and the Army Corps regarding the Wharf project.

The Pitt students have submitted a municipal complex rendering to Council for review. Please provide input. The Mayor has been adding input on this project. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted we would like to add public restrooms so that events at Hope Park or the Amphitheater would have access to restrooms. Beth Bock Asked if the facades would be removed, which Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich responded the intent as this time is to move the Monongahela Bank façade to the left. This would leave fire access on the left and police access in the back. If anyone has any input on these drawings, please get them back soon. The estimated cost is approximately \$10M, which we do not have at this time, but this is a future project that we are hoping to be able to secure in the near future.

Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich will be sending information out from the engineering company Rivet, offering their services to Brownsville,

The editorial from the Young Preservationists from Sunday’s paper was sent to Council. We are number 5 in a key marketing plan.

Scenic Pittsburgh has also reached out, as they want to come out and do a walking tour. Beth Bock asked if all of Council would be invited, which Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted in the affirmative.

We are asking Senator Casey to assist with funding for the Union Station building, infrastructure, and the municipal complex. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted that people will have to be patient over the next several years, as the Borough will see several areas of construction as we grow and expand.

Paul Synuria would like to mention that Hope Park needs some type of fire pit or heating device, because it was freezing down there this past weekend. The propane heaters do not work in this type of cold. Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted a portable fire pit was used for the Steelers game and can be used for any other event at the Park.

Beth Bock noted that Denny Falsetto informed her that when the breaker was shut off for the lights, it also shut the timer off for the lights, so we may need a separate switch.

NEW BUSINESS

Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich has been talking to FNB regarding a line of credit in anticipation of these projects. Most of our grants are spend and get reimbursed, so we need to figure out how to pay for things up front and then wait for reimbursement. A line of credit will help us so that we can quickly pay for things and not tie up our general fund. Kasandra Ward noted that the Commissioners do something like this, but Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich noted you need a specific project for theirs. With a line of credit, we can do this without specific project requests. The Borough is sitting on \$1.2M in grants over the next several months and having an available line of credit to pre-pay for things would be to our advantage.

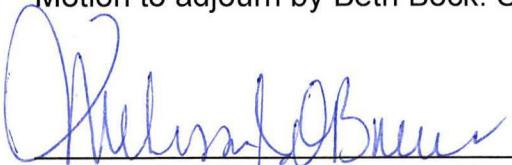
CORRESPONDENCE – Tracy Sheehan Zivkovich
